This handful of folks who wish life had a rewind button.

"Truly unbearable," was how Jonathan Baudilio Ramirez Salazar described Florida's weather when he spoke to his wife on the phone the night before. He'd worked one day in the thick July heat as a temporary laborer on a Fort Myers landscaping crew for TruScapes Industries Inc. His coworkers discovered him on his knees in a wooded area behind the complex around 4:40 p.m. He appeared to be seizing. His skin was hot. His heartbeat faint. Vomit lodged in his throat. When paramedics arrived, his body temperature was above 110 degrees. Ramirez died of heatstroke, according to medical examiner records. From his exposure on the job.

However, lagging indicators are reactive in nature and only offer actionable insights after an incident has occurred. In contrast, leading indicators take a proactive and preventive approach toward safety. They provide real-time information about the current safety status of a company, enabling proactive measures to prevent future injuries. For example, if safety audits reveal a consistent lack of proper fall protection among employees, this serves as an early warning sign that a fall incident may be imminent.
